A HIGHER CALLING

here are two titles for this message. The first title is: "A Higher Calling." The second title is called: "The Most Uncomfortable 40 Minutes of Your Life." The title you prefer will depend on how you respond to a sermon focusing on the scourge of the modern church: Internet pornography.

You may be thinking that doesn't seem like an appropriate topic to discuss in church. If that is true I would like to submit to you then, the Bible is inappropriate because the Bible does indeed address sex and marriage and intimate relationships. If you have read the Song of Solomon, you know it does so in a rather unapologetic fashion.

Furthermore, sex is good. It is God's intention and plan for many great reasons and to talk about sexual issues as if it's a shameful thing really is to say, "Your intention and plan isn't very good, God."

The fact that you and I tend to blush when the subject of sex is raised is more of a testimony to our corrupt nature than it is to the issue itself.

Can you imagine if I brought up the subject of waxed beans; nobody would walk out of church saying, "That is so inappropriate." Sex, in and of itself, is no more sinful than waxed beans.

Why then do we blush when the subject of sex is addressed? Because we have so corrupted it that we tend to think that sex is dirty in any context.

1 Corinthians 6 tells us that there is no sin that's so affects the body as sexual immorality. 1 Corinthians 6 also says all fornicators; all adulterers will have their part in a lake of fire. That alone should motivate us to push pass the awkwardness and tackle an issue that

has eternal consequences.

1 Timothy 1:10 says that fornicators will have their part in a lake of fire. James 1: 15 says that sin, when it comes to its fullest form, leads to death. This is not a peripheral issue, this is not a spiritual discipline, this is a matter of life and death and if you do not kill pornography in your life, it will kill you. Count on it.

A BIG PROBLEM

How pervasive is the sin of pornography? Brace yourself for these statistics.

"Focus on The Family" invited pastors to confess, "Have you, within the last month, intentionally gone to a pornographic site to view pornography?" Over 30% said "Yes." Those are the shepherds. What are the sheep doing?

According to Pure Life Ministries, 68% of evangelical men admit to viewing pornography on a regular basis. Pure Life Ministries discovered that 50% of pastors regularly view porn.

This is a huge, huge problem. Pornography is the seventh largest industry in our country. We must address it, as uncomfortable as it might be.
